## Aims & Objectives

### Background of NWT

The black ethnic and minority community in London Borough of Newham, especially the Bangladeshi community in particular children, young people and their family members often face rigorous difficulties in access to education, training and employment opportunities due to lack of or poor linguistic, cultural and communication skills. Some of the barriers they generally face include limited employment options, access to health and social services etc. Moreover, due to lack of understanding many families always hesitate to send their children to schools, particularly the backward communities. In the light of above, there were a genuine need to support and assist these families in ways that is most appropriate to their cultural values, with a series of discussions and meetings with the residents and community workers in the community in 2001 resulted in the desire to establish a charitable organisation, accessible to all sections of the community in the area, which is known as the Newham Welfare Trust (NWT). It took about two years to form this Charitable Trust in August 2003 following an election in the community. Later it was registered as a Registered Charity with the Charities Commission for England and Wales, in October 2004.

### Way to reach The Aim

- Newham Welfare Trust (NWT) seeks to replicate good practices and looks to avoid the constant reinvention of the wheel that sometimes exists across the voluntary sector.
- Through working in partnership with the statutory agencies (local authority, health authority, the police authority) as well all other structures of influence to help shape and influence planning, bring about the change and institute good practice.
- Newham Welfare Trust (NWT) strives to work with the support other similar organisations in their efforts to serve the community.
- The Executive committee is committed to working in a way that has transparency, accountability, excellent quality management, administrative systems and service.

### Our vision

Newham welfare Trust (NWT) shall remain as a politically unbiased voluntary organisation to assist the Minority Community Living in the Canning Town, Custom House, North Woolwich, Plaistow and Silver Town surrounding areas of London Borough of Newham through the provision of advice, information, counselling, support, interpretation, translation and other services. Our vision is to help the deprived community to reach the maximum potential of their lives so that they can contribute the maximum within the wider community. We are also committed to take initiative to extend living in Newham. To achieve this vision, we have set out the followings:

- Conduct or promote Research activities to find out the necessity of the community.

- Provide mother tongue educational support.
- Conduct or promote Research activities to find out the necessity of the community.
- Provide information and advice.
- Organise activities and events helping to preserve and enrich cultural heritage.
- Offer provision to support disabled people.
- Communities against Gangs, Guns and Knives activities for tackling guns, gangs and knives crimes among young people
- Enable the deprived families to share activities with members of other minority and wider British Community, hence facilitating better social integration.
- Training (Capacity building, Child protection, First Aid, Health & Hygiene).

### Our target groups

Newham Welfare Trust (NWT) identifies groups within the community that will make special efforts to reach.

- **Parents:** We are committed to empowering parents in the community to make informed choices outside of the mainstream through like-minded support and through offering factual information.
- **Non-participating Young People:** Researches have shown that young people from Black Ethnic and Minority Community, especially Bangladeshi young men has the lowest uptake of adult education in the UK and only have the most basic literacy standards. Moreover they are a very hard target group to reach. Therefore, we make special efforts to ensure that their needs are met.
- **Older People:** To enjoy social care and support within the Bangladeshi community; to benefit from health and leisure, appropriate housing and support/care in the community.
- **Excluded Women:** The provision of appropriate learning opportunities is essential in tackling women's exclusion from public life. NWT is committed to provide targeted programmes that build the levels of skills and confidence that women require to enter public life like others.
- **Children:** NWT takes steps to explore how children express and resolve unspoken feelings about traumatic experiences in play and other activities, based on their observations of peer support groups, outreach programmes and through individual's own accounts.
- **Global Relationship:** We have received an enormous demand from the community to move forward to help their living abroad and living under miserable living conditions.
- **Deprived community as a whole:** We encourage people within the deprived community to enjoy social and cultural activities available or offered by various organizations. This will help them understanding the dynamics of a mixed society like the UK.

## Home Work Club

The participants of this Homework Club were the children from primary schools. This club provides students with tutoring and mentoring as an after school support with an added benefit which provides us with a way of keeping in close touch with the students. Those interactions helped us to identify problems before getting extremely severe that the students were even forced to drop out of school. Through the Homework Club, NWT was able to intervene when a student has severe health, family, or economic problems.

The Homework Club was established with the objectives to provide support to the children from the disadvantaged families of the community who are under deprivation primarily due to the language barrier, educational backdrops and economic inactivity or poverty. Children from this group do not get enough logistical and educational backup from their parents. We try to help these group of children to overcome this hindrance by providing amusement and education in together to finish their home works assigned in their schools and help them to motivate and confident to finish it in time with the least need of assistance.

In order to complete the homework around 20 students would meet twice a week for 2 hours to complete the homework. The supervising adults would assist them to achieve this goal. The adult would also be in contact with the classroom teachers assisting them with feedback about students' progress and seeking information to improve helping the student. Parents would give permission for their children to be in the Homework Club where a regular attendance would be expected.



## Mother Tongue

One of the goals of the Trust was to provide the formal teaching on Bengali as a mother tongue to all Bangladeshi families living in this area. In fact, the Bengali class is the most significant project of the trust. The classes have been designed to support disadvantaged Bangladeshi children up-to the age of 8 - 16 (both primary and secondary) who have been underachieving in education. The secondary school going children, in particular those who chose Bengali as an additional subject have been benefited from this initiative.

Bengali Language, History, Culture and Heritage are the core subjects offered as a structured mother tongue course. Special attention was also provided in improving reading, writing and speaking skills in Bengali and also raising cultural awareness through a range of discussion topics during the classroom studies and followed by participation in question and answer sessions that aimed to improve their language skills. Moreover, the children attending classes are regularly asked to do home work and group work. The project follows the National Curriculum framework for Foreign Languages to maintain consistency with their mainstream studies.

These classes are important as Bengali is the language linked with their parents' culture which they have inherited from Bangladesh and this is widely practiced at home in the form of regular speaking. So this Bengali language is one of the vital tools to boost children's educational progress at the mainstream school.



## Anti-social behaviour

A survey on Anti-social behaviour (ASB) in our target community was carried out and the outcome shows that it has a negative effect on people's quality of life. Anti-social behaviour does not just make life unpleasant, it also holds back the opportunity for regeneration of disadvantaged areas and endangers the environment vulnerable to more serious crime. NWT took the initiative to tackle this problem in the project area. We are also committed to a range of supportive interventions which can engage individuals in changing their behaviour and help them to tackle some of the underlying problems.

ASB has a negative impact on people's lives such as young children as it limits their access to local parks because their parents are too petrified of taking them out, instead they are all cooped up in the house; as a result their health, social and physical development is immensely affected. This kind of activity takes up countryside but Canning Town is still very high and almost on the top compared to other places. We have gathered that community in Newham has a burning issue of ASB. The service users on our other regular programmes has raised these issues or coming in with the complaint on ASB. Due to ASB participants are afraid to come out of the house during day time and some also suffered from street crime and racial abuse.

ASB includes a variety of behaviour covering a whole complex of selfish and unacceptable activity that can blight the quality of community life; we mainly focus on the following issues and took initiative to work for it:

- People dealing and buying drugs on the street
- People dumping rubbish and abandoning cars
- Rowdy and nuisance neighbours
- Acts provoked by racist attitude
- Yobbish behaviour and intimidating groups taking over public spaces
- Vandalism, graffiti and fly-posting

NWT organized a various range of activities including peer group discussion, meetings with parents, counselling, awarding young people who have proven to be role models to others with their behavioural changes.



## Tackling guns, gangs and knives among young people

With the direct and active support of UK Home Office, Newham Welfare Trust has been running this project over the years. The aim of the project is to make a friendly environment in Canning town, Custom House and Silver Town area and also to reduce gun/knife crime among young people involved or risk of being involved in gun/knife crime or gang activity through arranging different activities like sports, music and IT training to enable them to become respectable, successful men of tomorrow.

The project has selected 25 young people who are at risk of being involved with knife crimes due to various disadvantages and arranged for them exercise session and music classes and exercise session. The project has improved music skill of the young people and increased their involvement with exercise and recreational activities.

The young people were from different backgrounds and they had different choices about exercise and music. We distributed questionnaire and collected feedback from them. We reviewed our planning on exercise session and music. We introduced group exercise and group music. Next time we will introduce indoor sports.



## Cultural Festivals

We live in a world where identity matters. It matters both as a concept, theoretically and as a resonance, inside and outside the academic world. One of the indicators of the well-being of our society is the approach we take to the cultural diversity of the population and the value placed on exploring our cultural traditions. Participation in culture and arts activities helps to define who we are from the Bengali Community and allows us to express our cultural values and practices and to pass cultural traditions on to future generations.

Newham Welfare Trust has organised cultural festivals in Canning Town and Custom House. Families from the local area attended the event along with their children and friends and enjoyed the happiness of the event. The event was hosted at the Newham Welfare Trust Hall and we had distinguished guests from Newham MP, Councillors and other well wisher of NWT.

The opening was taken place with Reciting of Quran and then we had speeches from different guest speakers from different sectors who discussed the issues around the Canning Town area and how we can elevate this problem by working together. Light refreshments were served after the discussion session.

We also organise different programmes to celebrate the Bengali New Year and International Mother Language Day (21st February) to present the glorious history of Bengali people and cultural. We also celebrate the Christmas day and New Years Day with equal importance.



## Indoor activities

Newham Welfare Trust arrange some indoor activities to make engaged children and young people in play games and some social activities by which they share their thoughts and know each other and build the friendship in the community and avoid getting involved in anti-social activities.

Children and young people love to play and through their play they learn. Children and young people from all the communities are jointly play together without any prejudices, and the most popular and highly participated programme is the indoor games club of the trust.

The popular games were Dart games, Bucket Bonanza, Tic Tic Tossa amongst them were the most popular was building blocks, puzzles, quiz etc. Like last year, we again had to face an acute shortage of floor space to meet the need of the community for this programme.



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## Capacity Building Training

We provide a range of training opportunities with seminars covering diversity issues within voluntary sector groups; Implementing an Exit Strategy; and Social Enterprise Development. We have also held the following organisational development workshops in collaboration with other voluntary sector staff, volunteers and committee members:

- Business Planning
- Implementing your Child Protection Policy
- Finance and other policy making.
- Applying to Trusts
- Charity Constitution and organisational legal papers drafting

The programme aims to enhance and develop Trusts' confidence, leadership and skills to advance improvement as well as developing their capacity to learn, innovate and share knowledge and expertise about what works and how. In addition, it provides support to local government to drive forward its own development. It can also help to respond to new priorities such as improving efficiency and the implementation of the pay and workforce strategy.




## Trainings Programmes

Capacity building is an essential element of the strengthening of any individual or organisation and the empowerment of staffs. This could be the development of an individual's knowledge and skills or building national, or even international, capacity. There is huge demand for the community regeneration projects among the local Bangladeshi community. The needs of this project came through informal discussion, focus group and parents of the educational programmes and other users.

Training encourages people to greater involvement in the local community activities in a more structured way. This improves the ability for the management committee in order to expand the project activities and have access to funding opportunities. This project brings a better prospect to the members, users, staff and local community to engage and contribute to the local regeneration programmes.

List of training that NWT provides are as follows;

10. Food handling




## Fundraising Event

Newham Welfare Trust (NWT) is devoted offer facilitate and support the underprivileged and disadvantaged people of the community and to carry out its charitable activities both locally and internationally. Like most other non-profitable charity organisation the main source of finance is from various fund raising events and activities. We instigate such fund raising programmes throughout the year. A number of events were arranged ranging from special fund raising events, charity dinner to outdoor fund collection scheme, charity bucket collection and bag packing in Supermarkets etc.

Newham Welfare Trust (NWT) also organizes fund raising activity through live programmes at national television where viewers generously donate according to their ability. For example, last year a charity appeal programme was held in channel i.

Charity dinner was another fund raising event where prominent guests, celebrities and successful members of the community and of the nation participated in a dinner party with quality foods and famous chefs, expertise in Bengali cuisine helped us in the food preparation. The dinner was followed by a cultural event performed by internationally renowned artist's musicians.

Newham Welfare Trust (NWT) also has outdoor fund raising activities. Our volunteers help us on different occasions raising funds in the streets and other urban locations. We are grateful to those who generously donate in NWT bucket and bag packing collection and those who actively and voluntarily participated and make those fundraising events successful.



## Overseas Activities:

The Bangladesh project is always a month long programme where we support the poor and disadvantaged people living in the rural corners of Bangladesh.

Newham Welfare Trust has been distributing the sanitation, tube wells and educational materials over the years. We have also raised money to rebuild people houses and buy Rickshaw/Rickshaw Van, Fishing boat, Tractor, Sewing machine etc. so helpless people will be provided with tools of earning their means.

Newham Welfare Trust had always provided financial support and other supports to the victimise people by every natural disasters like Cyclone Aila, Cyclone Sidor, every year flooding in Bangladesh.

Newham Welfare Trust has raised funds and supported this sort of disasters for Bangladesh for long time run the different projects. We raise our funds via Television Channels in the UK e.g. Channel i, NTVeurope, Channel 9, Bangla TV and the donation made by our trustees and funders.

We run our projects in Bangladesh especially for poor elderly people, widows and orphan children.



**Elderly & Disable People:** Poor old people in Bangladesh are very helpless and not able to do any work. Sometimes they feel lonely and there is none to look after them or support them to live. Newham Welfare Trust has been providing little financial aid and support, arranging shelter and medication for these poor old people over the past years. We basically run this project in rural areas in Bangladesh.

We also run a project of lunch club for these elderly people once a month by which those elderly people get together in a place and the share their feelings with each other. Newham Welfare Trust's Bangladesh branch in Sylhet arranges these activities and run the projects.



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**Widows:** Social discrimination against the widows is a serious concern in Bangladesh. They are deprived of their economic rights. They have no right to the family property and remain mostly in social isolation in the male dominated society and have no choice but to depend on their male relatives. The widows live a highly vulnerable life. Despite all the hardship and social injustice, the situation of widows remains under reported and unaddressed by the local government in the country. Newham Welfare Trust has been running projects for these merely helpless widows over the past years. We run projects to build or repair house and help them to live. In some case, there are some widows who do not have the least land where they could build a kureghar. Newham Welfare Trust tries to buy a piece of land and build at least a kureghar for those widows.

Widows in Bangladesh are so helpless that sometimes they have to beg to survive. In the light above, we try the level best to make them self-dependent so that they do not have to look at someone's help. Our projects give them training by which they become able to earn. In order to do so; we buy sewing machine and give the appropriate training. We Newham Welfare Trust believe in making one self-dependent.



**Orphan:** An orphan is a child whose parents are dead or have abandoned them permanently, in common usage, only a child who has lost both parents is called an orphan.

Among third world countries; Bangladesh is one of the most densely populated countries in the world with a population of 158 million, of these just over half are below the age of 15. A huge proportion of these children are orphaned without at least 1%, this means that they have to work to earn money to support themselves and their families.

In Bangladesh; most children will leave school by the age of 8, this may be partly due to the small government expenditure on education. Leaving school early is a direct result of poverty as children must work to support themselves and their families.

Newham Welfare Trust has been receiving generous donations, to help to run the school education, to provide the best and update education for these young children to have a bright further in their lives. On behalf of Newham Welfare Trust we would like to thank for their generous donations that we have receive.

About 5 million children between the ages of 5 to 14 work often very long hour in hazardous condition for very low wages. Orphans and street children in Bangladesh often are thrown in jail for minor crimes, or they are abused and subjected to the most atrocious violence; the majority of orphanages are overcrowded and do not have the capacity to take in these children, therefore they are forced to rummage through landfills for food and plastics to sell.

Newham Welfare Trust has been running projects for these orphans through the Bangladesh branch which includes;

- Providing educational materials and expenses until they become ready for a suitable job according to their knowledge and potentiality.
- Providing vocational training to make them self-dependent.
- Arrange employment for those already finished their education and vocational training.

Newham Welfare Trust runs the projects to ensure the education program and the training for the orphans with collaborating the local schools and the local authority. Our volunteers in Bangladesh have been working hard to make sure the projects running effectively and to develop the community.
